Behaviour


As you know we have been working to improve our positive behaviour strategy and following listening to our whole school community it is ready to be unveiled.

This is what it looks like in the classroom.....

Behaviour during learning time.

All classes will display a behaviour chart. The behaviour chart has the same ethos throughout school but is themed differently between KS1 and KS2. Both charts are double sided with the side showing the children's name facing the wall, the intention here is to 'Praise in public and reprimand in private' therefore avoiding naming those who demonstrate wrong behaviours.

On the reverse are the children's names.

Green Behaviour:

Green behaviour (or the sun for KS1) is our expectation for all children. This is where the children start off from on a daily basis.

Those children who have demonstrated Green behaviour all week will receive a 'l've been green all week' stamp in their planners.

Rainbow Behaviour:

The rainbow represents our 'Shine' children who always demonstrate outstanding behaviour. A child progresses to the rainbow when they first show evidence of this excellent behaviour and they remain there until the end of the half term unless they demonstrate behaviour otherwise. At the end of each week these children will receive a 'rainbow' stamp in their planners to inform parents of their excellent behaviour. A half termly treat will also be rewarded. The ethos here is to ensure our Shine children are rewarded for their efforts and that this message is conveyed home regularly.

Amber (and White Cloud) Behaviour:

Where a child does not display Green behaviour, they will need to reposition their name onto the Amber/White cloud symbol. There are 3 increments within this stage:

- 1) A verbal warning from the teacher "You are on Amber, can you turn this around?"
- 2) 5 Minutes time out in class.

3) Child sent to a buddy classroom to continue their work for a short-time (this is very unusual at All Saints')

These children will not receive a stamp in their planners that week.

Red (and Dark Cloud) Behaviour:

Once a child has progressed through the 3 stages of amber, they are then on Red. A child on Red will be sent to a member of the Senior Leadership Team and a telephone call will be made to home explaining what has happened to parents. A child can progress straight to red if they display any of the behaviours below. We appreciate these are broad heading and each behaviour will be considered on an individual basis.

Sanctions of red behaviour will be decided by SLT in consultation with parents.

We are trialling this strategy for one term and will review this at the end of the first summer half term.

As you may know, **World Book Day 2020** is almost upon us and – alongside reading being a focus in school – this year we are shaking things up! This year, instead of focusing on dressing up, we are looking in-depth at texts and at further developing a passion for books.

During the week, children across the school will all be reading the same text (to be revealed!).

On <u>Wednesday 4rd March</u>, we are extremely excited to welcome Halifax-based author Brian Abram, who will be reading his newly published book to our pupils. Brian is a full-time wheelchair user and his books are called 'The Adventures of Grandad Wheels'. In Brian's book he tells hilarious stories of his silly adventures with his grandson, aiming to show that anyone is a wheelchair can have fun and be fun to be with.

Copies of Brian's book can be purchased on the day for the price of £6.99. All profits from the sales will go to two charities - BackUp and SIA (Spinal Injuries Association).

On <u>Thursday 5th March</u>, we will be hosting a schoolwide book swap. Children can bring in a used and read book from home, and we will be hosting a 'swap shop' for children to take home a book that is new to them. Children are also welcome to bring in something comfortable (e.g. a teddy bear, blanket) for additional 'cosy reading time' to highlight the enjoyment of hearing a book being read aloud before bedtime.

Furthermore, anytime during the week, we are inviting children to bring into school a **Potato Book Character**. These fun characters – all made from a potato (ideas below and many more online!) - will be entered into a competition and a panel of judges will award prizes across school on Thursday.





So far this academic year, reading has been a real priority in school. We are over the moon to have supported our three youngest classes to all become library members following trips to Skircoat Green library. Our next step is for Key Stage 2 children to do the same at Central Library in Halifax – more details to follow.
